



Hello, and thank you for booking your Belize vacation with Slickrock Adventures. We're excited to share our immersive rainforest and reef experiences with you! This document has all you need to help you prepare for your trip of a lifetime.

Belize: Need to know

This small Central American country is a laid-back, English-speaking nation that's very safe to visit. Its subtropical climate promises balmy year-round temperatures, with only two real seasons: wet and dry. Our trips operate in the dry season from November until May, so although downpours can still occur, you'll experience Belize at its best. The water is safe to drink in most areas and the standard of healthcare is among the highest in Central America. Better still, passport holders from the USA, Canada, European Union, UK and most Commonwealth countries can visit Belize visa-free. If your passport is from another country, please check current requirements with your local Belizean consulate.

Our packages include airport transfers and accommodation in Belize City at the start and end of your Slickrock adventure. All you have to do is get yourself to Belize: we'll take care of the rest.

If flying from Europe, the best connections are via the US or Mexico. From North America, flights connect through major hubs such as Houston, Miami or Fort Lauderdale. Why not fly in a day or two before your adventure begins; that way, there's less risk of flight delays impinging on your trip, plus it allows time to explore Belize City and its tropical hinterland.

The local currency is the Belizean dollar, but US dollars are also accepted (*the exchange rate is two Belizean to every US dollar*). It's best to bring plenty of cash with you as ATMs are not always reliable and local banks do not offer the full 2:1 exchange rate. Travelers' checks are not easily redeemed in Belize, so are best avoided.

Need to know

On arrival

Your Slickrock adventure begins when you arrive in Belize City. Once you've cleared immigration and customs at the international airport, a van from the Best Western Biltmore Plaza Hotel will transfer you to the Best Western Biltmore Plaza Hotel (belizebiltmore.com). You'll meet other members of your group at a pre-arranged time for induction, then get to know each other over dinner at the hotel. Please try to be on time for the induction and all group activities thereafter as this will help your Slickrock experience to get off without a hitch.

Health and safety

Your Slickrock trip can be as adventurous and active (*or otherwise!*) as you like. You don't have to be a trained athlete to enjoy the activities on offer, but a reasonable level of fitness will allow you to make the most of your stay. Whether it's kayaking, snorkeling, paddle-boarding or any other activity, full tuition and instruction is provided as part of the experience, so use the opportunity to test your limits and try something new. If you are in poor physical condition, or have special medical considerations you should call us first and consult with your physician before signing up for a trip.

Although our guides are trained in first aid, you'll be travelling to remote areas that are far from medical support. We recommend that you purchase travel insurance that covers relevant risks as well as medical expenses and unexpected cancellations and other risks of travel. Our recommendation is Travelex, although they only offer insurance policies to US residents. Call Travelex: +1-800-228-9792, and tell them that you are traveling with Slickrock. Slickrock's location number is 37-0142. You can also visit Travelex's website.

It's also worth updating your vaccinations if required, especially simple shots for the likes of hepatitis and tetanus. Those travelling inland may

wish to consider precautions against malaria, but the risks of infection are generally low. If in doubt, use mosquito repellent and ensure that bare skin is covered, especially in the evenings.

Those who travel inland should also consider taking precautions to prevent hepatitis.

Both zika and dengue fever have been reported, but there is no preventative treatment for either. There is no threat of malaria, dengue fever, zika, or hepatitis on our island, and at present (*July of 2019*) the risk is low for each of these diseases country-wide.

If you have a medical history of allergic reactions, you should also talk to your doctor about allergic reactions to marine life, and bring appropriate medications that your doctor recommends.



Health and safety Continued

If considering malaria medication, please remember that a course needs to be started prior to departure. Talk to your doctor if you have questions about malaria medication. However, mosquito control in larger metropolitan areas has eliminated mosquito habitats close to human population settlements. The only true protection against mosquito-borne illnesses is to not get bitten by a disease-infested mosquito. The best prevention for bites is to wear a bug repellent that contains at least 25% DEET and to wear long sleeve pants and shirts when in areas where mosquitoes are currently present (*carry them in your daypack for quick access if mosquitoes show up*).

Hepatitis A is contracted through infected water; our drinking water is safe on all of our trips. If you plan to travel extensively in remote areas before or after our trip you should consider the Hepatitis A vaccination. For more info see: wwwnc.cdc.gov/travel/destinations/traveler/none/belize

Be sure to bring a water bottle and drink plenty of water while out on the island. We use collected and purified rainwater.

Our guides are trained in First Aid, but cannot be expected to serve as doctors. All participants should be sure their own medical coverage is adequate. We assume no responsibility regarding provision of medical care. Before your adventure, the best precautions are don't get hurt and make sure you are in good health the week before the trip. Remember you will be in an isolated area 35 miles off shore. Although we do have emergency contact with the mainland, it can take 12 hours or longer to get to a hospital on the mainland.

In reality, the only real risks to your health are sunburn and dehydration, so be sure to pack plenty of sunscreen and a hat. Those prone to suffering seasickness should bring appropriate medication if travelling out to Glover's Reef: parts of the three-hour journey can occasionally be choppy, but the scenery and occasional sightings of dolphins make this part of the adventure.

Know before you go

Our immersive, inclusive adventures include accommodation, transfers, guiding, meals, activities and use of all sporting equipment. The only things not included in the price are flights, snorkeling equipment and dinner in Belize City on the final night of your trip. Tips for staff members are at your discretion.

Though we schedule different activities each day, your Slickrock experience is not a boot camp: beyond the first snorkel orientation, there's no obligation to take part in anything that you don't want to do. Equally, our itineraries are flexible to take into consideration the weather, sea conditions or any other change in circumstances. We want you to have the very best experience in Belize, and our expert guides do everything to make your trip no less than magical.

We are proud of our exceptional safety record, but it's important to bear in mind that all outdoor activities carry an element of risk. Also, we can't control the weather: certain activities may not run if conditions are inclement. As a result, we ask all participants to sign a Waiver of Liability. Rest assured that our guides are extremely experienced and ensure that all activities are carried out in safety. Nevertheless we recommend that you take out travel insurance to give you peace of mind should you face unforeseen events.

Your booking is confirmed as soon as we receive your registration and deposit. The balance is payable 60 days before your adventure begins. Should you need to cancel your booking, please let us know without delay as fees may apply (*see below for full details of our cancellation policy*). We are unfortunately unable to refund payment if cancellation occurs within ten days of departure. Again, we recommend that you take out travel insurance to cover you in case of any need to cancel. Also, we recommend that you refrain from booking flights until your Slickrock booking is confirmed.

What to pack

Please read this list carefully and be sure to bring all the items required. Bear in mind that we operate in remote locations, so there's little scope to buy anything you've forgotten once we've left Belize City. We recommend that you bring all essential items and a change of clothes in your carry-on bag, just in case your checked luggage is lost or delayed.

The following items are essential to bring

- Sunscreen (ideally 30+)
- Baseball cap or wide-brimmed hat
- Towel(s) (*very important: these are not provided on the island*)
- Bathroom amenities
- First Aid kit and any medications you require
- Snorkeling gear – fins, mask and snorkel (*best purchased from a professional dive shop*)
- Lightweight “dive skin” or rash guard (*to protect against sunburn and jellyfish stings*)
- Neoprene reef shoes or sturdy river shoes
- Headlamp or flashlight (*with extra batteries*)
- Lightweight waterproofs (*in case of rain*)
- Sunglasses (*with safety strap*)
- Watch or travel clock
- Cash (*ATMs are a rarity in Belize*)

Full packing list

Clothing

You won't need more than swimsuits, T-shirts, shorts and casual evening wear, ideally with long sleeves in case the temperature drops or to deter insects. Lightweight items made from quick-drying fabric are most suitable. A fleece jacket might also be handy in case the evenings get chilly.

Note: you can do laundry by hand on the island.

- 1 set clean clothes for the flight home (*store in a plastic bag so they stay fresh. This is optional*)
- 2-3 pairs shorts and 3-4 t-shirts of quick-drying materials + casual evening wear
- 1-2 lightweight long-sleeve shirt and 1 pair lightweight pants for sun protection (*also bug protection on mainland*)
- 1 pair long underwear (*in case of colder weather/storms*)
- 1 light fleece (*for colder weather/storms*)
- Fast-drying underclothes
- 1-2 swimsuits
- Wide brim hat or baseball cap
- Buff for sun protection

Documents

- Copy of this information sheet
- Copy of your Confirmation Emails
- Passport for each traveling individual
- Scuba Card for divers

Toilet Kit

- Toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, shampoo, hair conditioner, lotion, shaving items, insect repellent containing at least 25% DEET, Reef safe sunscreen. *(Soap is provided in our showers and bathrooms. Guests are welcome to bring their own liquid soap. No bar soap, please)*
- 1-2 towels (towels are not provided on the island)
- Personal First Aid: Emergen-C *(electrolyte replacement drink mix)* for dehydration, antihistamine for allergic reactions to marine life, Imodium for stomach problems, ibuprofen for sore muscles, swimmer's ear for water sports, bandages and antibiotic cream for blisters, cortisone cream for bug bites

Gear

Don't get caught without the necessary gear

- Fins, Mask, Snorkel *(best found at a local dive shop)*
- Diveskin/swim tights/hydroskin/rash guard and/or wetsuit to protect from marine stings and the sun
- 1 pair sturdy river shoes or neoprene booties with a hard sole. We often walk on uneven, rocky, underwater terrain to access snorkel spots. They also provide essential foot protection during sports. Booties are essential, contact the office with any questions
- 1 pair sandals
- Waterproof rain jacket
- 1-2 water bottles *(can be bought in Belize)*
- Sunglasses with strap
- Headlamp or flashlight
- Watch or travel clock *(the island is too big to signal meal times or meeting times for activities)*

Nice to have

But not required

- Cell phone – may not work in Belize but comes in handy when traveling. Will not work on island, keep in a plastic bag to protect from island humidity
- Camera, batteries, small dry bag
- USB cord for charging cameras/devices
- Net bag for snorkel gear
- Paddling gloves or sun gloves
- Binoculars, though some are available on the island
- Dive light and batteries for night snorkeling or night diving
- Fly fishing gear
- Tennis shoes and socks *(for volleyball or our jogging path)*
- Extra hat and sunglasses
- Books, journal, games *(several games are already on the island)*

Money

- Bring cash for emergencies and incidentals. If you arrive late you will have to pay up to \$700 to catch up with the trip. You'll need other funds to cover taxi rides, beverages, your last night's dinner, and tips. You should bring at least \$1100 cash if traveling alone and \$1500 cash for a couple. Be sure to bring small bills as most businesses in Belize cannot break large bills. This cash is mainly to help you catch up with your trip should something go wrong. Working ATMs are hard to find in Belize and traveler's checks are not often accepted. You are likely to bring back most of the money you bring down.

Frequently-asked questions

Is this the right trip for me?

Our adventures are exceptional and memorable off-grid escapes, but they may not be to everybody's taste. Accommodation on the island is basic but comfortable, with sea breezes in place of air conditioning and composting, flush-free toilets. There's no maid service or wi-fi – but that adds to the appeal. What makes Slickrock really special is the faraway remoteness, plus the quality of the sports equipment, guiding and – above all – the excellent food. All meals, drinks, guiding and excursions are included in the price, so our trips offer exceptional value as well as being fully immersive. Guests are free to do everything on offer, or nothing at all. It's entirely up to you to choose how much to get involved. Height, age and weight restrictions may apply to certain activities: please call to discuss if you are unsure if you qualify.

How flexible are your trips?

We offer full and half week packages to the jungle and barrier reef, that can be mixed and matched as desired to create your own ideal, all-inclusive experience.

How do we get to Glovers Reef?

We provide round-trip transfers from Belize City in our own motorboat. The trip takes three hours each way and operates twice per week. As a remote, faraway destination, there is no other mode of transportation for getting to the reef. Guests arriving late will have to arrange their own private charter in order to catch up with the rest of the group.

What sort of activities do you offer?

We have kayaks of varying designs, windsurfing and stand-up paddleboards – more than any other resort in Belize. Snorkeling on the atoll is out of this world, but this is the one thing for which we do not provide equipment, so please bring your own.

What if I don't want to do group activities?

We offer up to four group activities in any one day. Participants wishing to undertake an activity beyond the group environment are free to do so provided they have attended the orientation and displayed their proficiency in that particular activity. However, your wellbeing remains our priority and we require that guests "buddy up" with a companion should they wish to break out on their own.

Is a week too long to stay out on the island?

Not at all. Long Caye offers the ultimate blend of adventure and relaxation. Many guests wish they had booked two weeks! Depending on your ability and fitness level, activities can take a while to master; and of course you need to make time to swing in every one of our hammocks.

Do I need prior experience?

Every activity we offer can be enjoyed by total novices thanks to the expert tuition provided by our guides. Equally, we have enough guides to ensure that guests who are proficient in any sport can break away from the main group and practice at a higher grade. Please note that the jungle adventures are somewhat more strenuous and challenging than those on the island.

What is the average group size?

Our island resort can accommodate up to 34 guests, while the jungle groups are smaller, with a maximum of 12. Our minimum group size is four adults. Children of all ages are welcome on the island, but the jungle activities are better suited to teenagers and up. Single travelers who don't want to share a cabin may wish to avoid busy times such as Christmas; at other times, there's more likelihood of having a cabin to yourself (with no single supplement).

Can I charge my electrical appliances?

Our island may be off-grid, but we generate power from solar and wind, so there is always juice to charge cameras and phones. Please note however that the salty air out on the island is very damaging to electronic appliances. On the jungle portion of Adventure Week, hotel rooms are equipped with electrical outlets. Please note that the use of drones is prohibited by government law (see below).

Can I bring my drone?

Please note that the use of drones is prohibited by government law. Belize is currently only accepting applications for authorization to operate drones from international drone operators, or travelers to Belize who have been commissioned for works and/or services for an approved local business or organization in Belize. The Government of Belize currently prohibits the temporary importation of drones for recreational or personal usage.

Is this a child-friendly vacation?

Slickrock's Adventure Island at Glover's Reef is great for kids, though age restrictions apply for activities and we do not offer a kids' club or dedicated activities. Families love our island trips because the itinerary is so flexible. Please ask us for more information if required. The minimum age on the island is three years; for the Adventure Week jungle experience, it's 10. The inland sports are best attempted with an adult-size body, for issues of both size and strength. Families with kids under 10 years should choose our island trip. Our safety procedures require that kids under 8 years of age must be accompanied by a babysitter or an adult from their party at all times. There is a price break for children under 12, but there are also restrictions. Please see our Kids Policy.

Can you provide a babysitter?

A babysitting service is available on the island (US\$25 per child per day, payable locally) with prior arrangement. Slickrock can facilitate very friendly, experienced babysitters for up to 8 hours per day with the cost borne by the guest. Single parents are advised to hire a babysitter if bringing more than one child if under 11. Our guides are not able to provide child-minding service.

Traveling with Children

All children under 18 years of age must have proper documentation, including a valid passport. Please note that under Belizean law, children under the age of 18 who are traveling with just one parent are required to carry a notarized letter of authority from the other parent indicating travel consent.

What's the situation with insects?

Being so far offshore, the island is surprisingly light on bugs. There are many more creepy-crawlies in the jungle, so bug spray is recommended.

What about the food?

On the island, all meals are served buffet-style and prepared from scratch by our talented chefs. Vegetables and fish are sourced from markets on the mainland and transformed into tasty and colorful dishes that celebrate Belizean cuisine. Vegetarian and gluten-free guests can be accommodated with prior notice. Those experiencing the jungle will dine on Belizean home cooking in the hotel restaurant. Water is safe to consume; on the island, we filter and purify rainwater for drinking.

Can I tip the staff?

Tips are not required but always greatly appreciated. All cash tips (normally calculated at around 10-15% of the cost per trip per guest) are handled by the trip manager, who divides it between the staff. Please note that the owners never take any part of the tips, with it solely going to the staff.

Passport

Visitors to Belize must possess a passport valid for at least three months after the date of arrival and a return ticket with sufficient funds to cover their stay. Visitors are given a one-month stay, after which an extension can be applied for with the Immigration Department. Visas are not required for citizens of the United States and its territories, Canada, United Kingdom and its territories, European Union, Caribbean, and Central American countries.

If late or delayed

What happens if I miss the induction and departure for the jungle or island?

Arriving late is a bad idea, which is why we recommend coming in a day or two in advance. We are not able to delay the group's departure to allow late arrivals to catch up. Those arriving late and wishing to catch up with the rest of the group must make their own way to the island or jungle lodge (at own expense) by chartering a boat or taking a taxi respectively. Both are expensive. If late or delayed, let us know straight away by calling our US office +1-800-390-5715 or emailing slickrock@slickrock.com. Your guide will be checking with us if you do not arrive. If no answer, leave a message with your plans and a call-back number.

What time do we need to be there?

If you arrive after 5:30 pm on Day 1:

Call the office in US to let us know your arrival time. Your guide can be reached until 8:00 pm at the Biltmore Hotel in Belize City 011-501-223-2302 and after that at the guide house 011-501-223-4129. If you arrive late on this evening, you can simply check in and meet your guide in the morning. Be ready for a 7:00 am breakfast. Be sure you have notified your guide somehow. They will keep trying to find you until they know where you are.

If you arrive before 9:00 am on Day 2:

With notice, we can hold the boat until 9:00 am only. Take a taxi to our dock at 69 Bella Vista in Belize City.

If you arrive after 9:00 am on Day 2:

You've missed the boat and will have to charter a boat to the island out of Dangriga, Belize. Our US office will help make arrangements, but you will have to pay on location for the boat and the flight to Dangriga \$95/person US. For this you will need a minimum of \$700 US cash (July 2019 rate) for the boat and a credit card for the flight. Local airlines Tropic Air, 011-501-224-5671, tropicair.com; Maya-Island Air, 011-501-223-1140, mayaislandair.com.

How much will it cost if my flight is delayed or cancelled?

The airline may cover the costs, but you should be prepared to pay for it yourself. This is when travel insurance is a lifesaver, although they do not reimburse you until after you get back home. We strongly recommend you purchase a policy. If delayed, you must pay upon receipt of services for any of the options listed. Your guide will not be able to cover the cost for you.

Which travel insurance best covers my trip?

For customers in the USA, our recommendation is Travelex +1-800-228-9792. To allow them to provide the best quote, mention Slickrock's location number: 37-0142.

What arrangements are made for late arrivals?

Sometimes people want to arrive a day late, and sometimes someone misses a flight and has an unscheduled late arrival. This is what is involved in getting to the island on your own.

I can't arrive until Saturday for the Adventure Island package; aren't the arrival days flexible? What do I do if I have to arrive late?

The only way to arrive late or depart early is to charter your own boat. Our boat runs out of Belize City every Saturday, and also many Wednesdays, but not all. The boat that takes you out to the island brings back the departing group from the week before. It's a 3-hour ride, so our boat must leave Belize City first thing in the morning to get out there (before international flights arrive that day), get unloaded and re-loaded, and return by dark. There is no guarantee of the time we return by because there are too many factors that are out of our control, but we usually get back to Belize City by 3:30 or 4:00 pm. It is not possible to delay this boat ride even a few hours. Also, sometimes we have to leave Belize City to go out to the island even earlier than usual due to an impending weather event. Therefore guests going out to the island have to arrive the evening before, we need everyone right there so we can leave when we need to, and departing guests do not get back in time to catch a flight the same day, as the last international flights leave Belize City about 4:00 pm.

Guests who wish to arrive late for some reason, or who miss a flight and must arrive late, will be responsible for chartering their own boat from Dangriga, Belize (not Belize City) out to the island. The cost is currently \$700 US for the boat and \$95/person US for the flight between Dangriga and Belize City, (July 2019 rate, can increase without notice). When guests charter a boat, we will arrange it for the guest, but the ride itself is outside of our responsibility and is at the risk of the guest, we cannot be responsible for it. We only arrange with captains we have had good results from in the past, but these individuals are not our employees and it is not an official part of the trip package. Guests must carry \$700 US in cash to pay for this boat ride on site. Please do not wait until you get to Belize to try to procure cash.

To meet the charter boat, guests must first fly 20 minutes to Dangriga on one of two airlines: Tropic Air tropicair.com or Maya Island Air mayaislandair.com. Tickets can be purchased on the website of either airline up until 3 days prior to the flight. After that reservations must be made by phone. Advance payment is not required.

Dangriga is 35 miles from Belize City, and the boat ride could take anywhere from 1.5 hours to 4 hours, depending on the weather. Because the weather can never be predicted, the latest time of day that you could safely leave Dangriga and make it to Long Caye before dark in any weather would be 2:30 pm. This means the last flight you could take is the 1:45 pm flight on Tropic (arriving in Dangriga at 2:00 pm). Maya Island Air's last flight that meets this schedule is the 1:30 pm flight (arriving in Dangriga at 1:45 pm). All later flights these airlines offer get to Dangriga too late to gather your luggage, get picked up, be driven to the dock, get loaded on the boat, and get out to Glover's Reef before dark, leaving extra time for problems.

Guests must be responsible for following these guidelines. Belizean captains will leave any time you ask to make you happy, and they have been known to make a poor judgment call in this regard. It is the guest's responsibility not to get on any boat leaving Dangriga after 2:30 pm. If your flight is delayed or you are delayed for any other reason, you should overnight in Dangriga and go out to the island the next morning. If you find that you will be late, you need to contact our office via email slickrock@slickrock.com or phone +1-800-390-5715 so that we can contact the island and let them know you will come out first thing the next morning. We recommend these hotels in Dangriga: Pelican Beach: 522.2044, Chaleanor: 522.2587.

Occasionally guests will make their own boat arrangements without consulting us. If you choose to do this, be sure the boat you hire has two engines and be sure the boat has lifejackets and be SURE you wear the lifejackets. Belizeans captains will not always insist on this.

Guests who choose to arrive late because they can't meet our schedule need to stay in close contact with us. Occasionally extreme weather means we have to delay our boat a day, so rather than fly on to Dangriga you would meet the delayed group in Belize City and go out with us the next day. You need to contact the US office right before you leave to make sure "Plan A" is still a go.

Cancellations

No exceptions are made to our cancellation policy for any reason. All fees listed below are per person, per package. Trips cancelled within 10 days of departure are not applicable for refunds.

How to cancel a trip

To cancel, please call or email without delay. Your cancellation is not complete until we have acknowledged receipt. Fees vary but depend on the time between cancellation and departure; see full details below. Cancellation fees still apply even if Slickrock is able to re-sell your space.

Cancellation fees for trips with a launch date between January 6 and December 14 of any year

If you must cancel, payments will be refunded, minus a fee which is calculated as follows: If we receive notice of cancellation 75+ days before departure, the fee is \$100 US; 74-60 days, \$250 US; 59-46 days, \$450 US; 45-30 days, 50% of trip cost; 29-11 days, 75% of trip cost; if notice is received within 10 days of departure, no refund is given.

Cancellation fees for trips with a launch date between December 15 and January 5 of any year

For peak-season bookings, the cancellation policy is as follows: If we received notice of cancellation 90+ days prior to departure the fee is \$300 US; 89-61 days, 50% of trip cost; 60-45 days, 75% of trip cost; 44-0 days, 100% of trip cost.

Trip cancellation insurance

Should you cancel your trip because of illness, injury, or death of a family member, trip insurance protects your payments. We strongly recommend the purchase of trip insurance. For customers in the USA, our recommendation is Travelex +1-800-228-9792, quoting reference 37-0142.

Bookings received within the 60-day (90-day for Christmas period) window

In case of late bookings full payment is required at the time of reservation. If payment has not been received by the deadline, we reserve the right to assume cancellation and fill the space from our

waiting list (cancellation fees still apply).

Slickrock trip cancellation

We reserve the right to cancel a trip in the face of unforeseen circumstances. If cancellation is necessary, all of your money will be refunded, but our financial liability shall be limited to the amount actually paid and shall not be extended to cover any other costs incurred by the trip member.

Itinerary changes

We reserve the right to make changes in the itinerary if necessary due to weather conditions or other factors beyond our control. No refund is given if this occurs.

Unused services

No partial refunds or credits will be given for unused services such as hotel rooms or meals. Our trips are quoted as a package; credits are not given for services not used. No refunds will be given for any reason once the trip has begun.

TRANSFERS

All fees listed below are per person, per trip

Transferring to another date or selling your seat to lessen fees incurred

If you have signed up for a trip and find that you can't attend, your travel insurance policy should provide at least some compensation. If you did not purchase such a policy, or if you would prefer to transfer to another date, you may switch to another trip during the same season only with penalties listed below. Slickrock's season is December - May. We cannot transfer reservations at no cost because once you sign up, numerous arrangements are made for you immediately. If you do transfer to another date and subsequently cancel that trip, the cancellation fee reflects back to the original date and trip that you first transferred from, although the transfer fees incurred still apply.

If you transfer from a trip that was put on sale to a trip that was not on sale, your balance will revert to the non-sale rate. You also may sell each seat you have a reservation for to another person you recruit at any time with a fee to you of \$50/seat US transferred.

Transfer fees for trips with a launch date between January 6 and December 14 of any year

In addition to the cost of the trip you are transferring to, the fees are as follows: If we receive notice of transfer 75+ days before the departure date of the trip you are transferring from, the fee is \$50 US; 74-60 days, \$100 US; 59-46 days, \$150 US. No transfers are allowed for trips 45 days or less from departure, see cancellation fees listed.

Transfer fees for trips with a launch date between December 15 and January 5 of any year

In addition to the trip cost of the trip you are transferring to, the fees are as follows: If we receive notice of transfer 90+ days before the departure date of the trip you are transferring from, the fee is \$100 US; No transfers are allowed for trips 89 days or less from departure, please see cancellation fees listed.
